MONITORING & MAINTENANCE

REST, our Ethiopian implementation authority, is responsible for day-to-day implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the project. A division exists within REST to specifically carrying out these activities, as per the following procedures:

1. Monitoring

Through progress reports: Staff generate semi-annual progress impact and financial reports. The formats and procedures are developed and pre-tested with all actors before being made operational.

Through Field Visits: REST's office staff make quarterly field visits to access reports coming from the operational departments. All information is then checked, consolidated and circulated.

Centralised Tracking Inputs to Monitor Progress: Financial tracking is linked with specific programme activities, enabling areas to be pinpointed requiring special attention.

Performance Monitoring by Project Participants: Staff at Baito (Council) level access and record done, what's gone well, what hasn't and why. This methods assists to motivate people, maintain group cohesiveness and improve performance. Assessments occur daily, periodically at week's end and at the completion of the work.

2. Evaluation

Internal (On-going) Evaluation: Examines a project's continued relevance or the overall effectiveness of the intervention strategies adopted.

Formal (Impact) Evaluation: Measures the project's impact by assessing changes brought about by the project. They cover planning, gathering or recording baseline data, and managing & implementation.

Community Based Evaluation: District (woreda) & people's councils (tabia baito) regularly facilitate an evaluation process with the majority of the community members. It evaluates progress and plans for future interventions. Valuable information is consistently generated from these sessions.

Terminal Evaluation: Every 2 or 3 years, the donor (in collaboration with REST, concerned agencies and communities) will conduct terminal evaluation on the impact of the rural water supply and sanitation programme. The next such evaluation is due in the next few months.

3. Sustainability and Phase-out Strategy of the Project

Technical Sustainability: Community based projects are sustainable only if they are designed with appropriate technology and are maintained by the owners themselves. They are developed on community needs and on appropriateness of technologies adopted by the people. Community capacity building is imperative to ensure sustainability.

Sustainability in management: Villagers decide on the water fee (collected and held by them) for the caretaker's salary and for operation & maintenance supplies. This confirms the economical sustainability.

Social Sustainability: The commitment & participation of the communities in all phases of the project, is very significant. Such participation has led to a sense of ownership of the completed product.

Gender Sensitivity: The project also focuses on reducing the burden of women & girls. The reduction in women's workloads have a social value in better health, time saving, and diversification of income sources. The WATSAN committee chosen and trained has at least 50% women with the Treasurer usually a woman.



Phase-out strategy of the project: With completed wells handed over, the WATSAN committee is trained and 3 months spare parts are provided to the committees. REST revisits each village 3 months after completion, to ensure maintenance & bookkeeping is implemented as originally planned, and providing additional teaching if it is not.
